Q1) Why should you make detailed notes during your PSHE sessions this HT?

Q2) What could happen on Results Day 2024 that could be disappointing?

- You could get results that are lower than your capabilities.
- You can't do anything about your results.
- You may have to find an alternative place/course to study.







Q3) How can you avoid this?

- Listen to teachers.
- Work hard.
- Take advantage of support/catch up sessions.
- Go to P6.
- Do your Extended Learning.
- Get to school on time.
- Make sure your behaving like a young adult...because you are one!

Q4) In terms of careers what needs to be decided by the end of Year 11?

- You need to have decided on a place to go.
- You need to have applied for (at least) one sixth form or college.
- If you might not get the entry requirements for your first choice, or you are doing an apprenticeship, scholarship, specialist college or are joining the armed forces, you will need a back-up.

Notice, nobody has said you need to know exactly what career/job you want to do yet!



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- What do you enjoy?

- How do you learn best?



Q5) What support is available to help you make these decisions?

Q6) What is a Taster Day and what do you need to remember?

- A Taster Day is a 'day in the life of a student' at the place you are going after Year 11.
- When you apply for your Taser Day, you should be 90% sure it's where you would like to go.
- Huntington School will oversee the Taster Day application process, please <u>DO NOT</u> book onto any Taster Days yourself.



Q6) What must you do if you are applying for the armed forces, apprenticeships, specialist colleges and sports scholarships?

- You must also apply for a York based college or sixth form (back-up).
- This back-up is where you will do your Taster Day











Q8) What is your first main deadline, and what should you have decided by then?

By early November 2023, you will be applying for your Taster Day (that's 5 months).

Remember...

- When you come back in September, you should have a pretty good idea of where you would like to go/do.
- If you are planning to do an apprenticeship, go in the armed forces or attend a specialist college/scholarship, you will also need to do a York based college or sixth form Taster Day (back up)

Q2) What are small Level 3 Qualifications

- You study 3 or 4 subjects and receive a separate grade for each.
- You can study them in sixth form or at York College.
- The most well-known one is the A-Level, but they have lots of different names!

Typical Sixth Form Application:

- PE
- English Language
- Criminology
- ICT



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
- PE A Level

Q3) What are the entry requirements to study A Levels?

- Mostly Grade 5 and above at GCSE
- Some subjects require higher grades in certain subjects







Q3) What are big Level 3 Qualifications

- You study one subject.
- You get a grade which is equivalent to studying 3 small Level 3s.
- They can only be studied at college.







Q4) What types of big Level 3 qualifications can you study at college?

- Extended Diplomas
- T Levels
- Apprenticeships (sort of)







Q6) What are the entry requirements for non-A Levels Level 3 qualifications (big and small) Level

- Extended Diplomas and small non-A Levels – mostly 4s at GCSE
- T Levels Mostly 5s at GCSE
- Apprenticeships mostly 4s at GCSE










Q7) What would happen if you don't get the entry requirements for Huntington Sixth Form?

 Sadly, you just can't come, and you will need to go somewhere else.

Q8) What would happen if you didn't get the entry requirements needed for college?

- You can still go, but they will put you on a lower-level course for a year.
- So, a two-year course would take 3 years instead.

V Big Level 3 Qualifications

Types of Subjects (York College):

Art and Design, Fashion Design, Graphic Design, Business, Computer Game Development, Computing, Health and Social Care, Travel and Tourism, Creative Media Production, Performing Arts (Acting, Dance, Musical Theatre, Backstage), Sports Coaching, Uniformed Public Service, Exercise Science, Personal Training, Science, Electrical Installation.



Types of Subjects (Askham Bryan):

Football and Education (Leeds Utd), Personal Training, Agriculture (Arable, Mechanics, Livestock), Animal Management (Companion, Wildlife, Zoo, Animal Management Science (for Veterinary Nursing), Arboriculture, Equine (Management, Sport), Animal Nursing and Welfare, Floristry, Horticulture, Gamekeeping, Motorsport, Outdoor Adventure Sport, Uniformed Public Services





Q9) What are the pros/cons of small Level 3 qualifications?

Pros:

- Lots of variety
- Keep your options open
- Stay in familiar setting (if you stay at Huntington)
- Traditional, well-known qualifications

Cons:

- Strict entry requirements
- Generally exam focused







Q10) What are the pros/cons of big Level 3 qualifications?

Pros:

- Less exam focused
- Same qualification (level) as doing small Level 3s
- More practical
- More flexible entry requirements
- Important as a back-up!

Cons:

- Less variety
- Only available at colleges







Q11) In which situations must you have a back-up?

- You are undecided.
- You are applying for an apprenticeship, specialist college, scholarship or the armed forces.
- There is a chance that you might not meet the entry requirements for your chosen course.
